Rainfall made river levels rise



VILLAHERMO-SA - Rainfall recorded in Tabasco on Monday has caused river water levels to rise and low temperatures

in the state, reported the National Water Commission (CONAGUA).

CONAGUA indicates that rivers such as the Tacotalpa, Pichucalco, Teapa and La Sierra in Tabasco's mountainous zone have risen by 21, 20, 13 and 2 centimeters respectively.

The Commission reported that the rivers remain at sub-critical levels between 3.02 and 7.49 meters. The Grijalva river, that runs past Villahermosa, rose by 4 centimeters to 2.84 meters but remains below its maximum level.

Each year floods occur in Tabasco despite efforts of the state government to improve infrastructure.

In November this year flooding in Tabasco was reported to have affected at least 200,000 people. On December 18, the state government through the Economic Development Secretariat (SEDECO), gave 36 million pesos in assistance to 730 businesses affected by the recent floods in the La Chontalpa zone.

The November outbreak of dengue fever in the state was exacerbated by the recent flooding. However last Monday, the State Health Secretariat reported that its anti-dengue fever measures had been effective, with recorded cases dropping by 80 percent.
